

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
## Models and Characteristics of Clinical Partnerships

- Established a standing initial licensure committee with clinical partner and stakeholder membership.
- Licensure committee membership includes education and content faculty, university leadership, school leaders and teachers, candidates, and program alumni.
- Licensure committee activities include: Review of outcomes data, discussion of recommended program improvements, approval of curriculum and policies, approval of candidates for licensure, evaluation of program plans, and school partner feedback for program revision and improvement.





- Annual program and clinical experience update with school district leaders
- Active membership on the Clinch-Powell Educational Cooperative Board
- Clinch-Powell Educational Cooperative executive director as EPP partner
- Addition of a seventh partner: Marion County School District, Tennessee





Development of a Mission Statement for the Clinch-Powell Advisory Council.

### **Mission Statement:**

The mission of the Clinch-Powell Educational Advisory Council is to share best practices and recommend areas of improvement to enhance teacher performance and advance student learning.

- 1. The Council will represent and communicate the common and special curriculum, assessment and professional development needs of the represented districts.
- 2. The Council will recommend solicitation of funding via grants, contracts, and support services (e.g., CORE)
- 3. The Council members will be selected by the Director of Schools from each respective county. The Council will be an ad hoc group authorized and approved by the CPEC Board of Directors.



- Establishment of the Clinch-Powell Educational Cooperative Advisory Council
- Authorized and supported by the CPEC Board
- Selection of representative school leaders from CPEC school districts
- Appointment of council leadership and creation of the EPP role
- Council foci: review of assessment data, faculty appointment, professional development needs and opportunities, common calendar review, funding opportunities, and state programs and services.
- Addition of a regional Department of Education representative



- Professional development programs hosted by the EPP for Pre-service Teachers, clinical partners, and regional school districts
- Program and financial support for collaborative professional development from Battelle for Kids!
- Programming for clinical partners and pre-service teachers
- Funding for district-level leaders from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation

Innovative school partnerships and collaborations are based on the theoretical premise presented in the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education Report, Transforming Teacher Education Through Clinical Practice: A National Strategy to Prepare Effective Teachers

All teacher preparation programs and districts have to start thinking about teacher preparation as a responsibility they share, working together. Only when preparation programs become deeply engaged with schools will their clinical preparation become truly robust and will they be able to support the development of candidates' urgently needed skills and learn what schools really need. Conversely, only through much closer cooperation with preparation programs will districts be able to hire new teachers who are better prepared to be effective in their schools. Through partnerships, preparation programs will be able to integrate course work, theory and pedagogy with practitioner knowledge.
